QUESTION TWO

Read the excerpt below and attempt the question at the bottom

Newer heart transplant method could allow more patients a chance at lifesaving surgery

A recent study (Encyclopedia Brittanica 2023) recommends organ donation after circulatory death because of its "potential to increase fairness and equity in heart transplantation, allowing more persons with heart failure to have access to this lifesaving therapy" (Dr. Nancy Sweitzer of Washington University in St. Louis). Patients have 90-94% chance of survival. This method does not require donors to be brain-dead. When family members decide to withdraw life support for their loved one and the heart stops, Doctors can remove and reanimate it through pumping of blood and nutrients for purposes of transplantation. Referencing two opposing ethical theories, analyze the ethical implications of this life saving intervention (25 marks).
